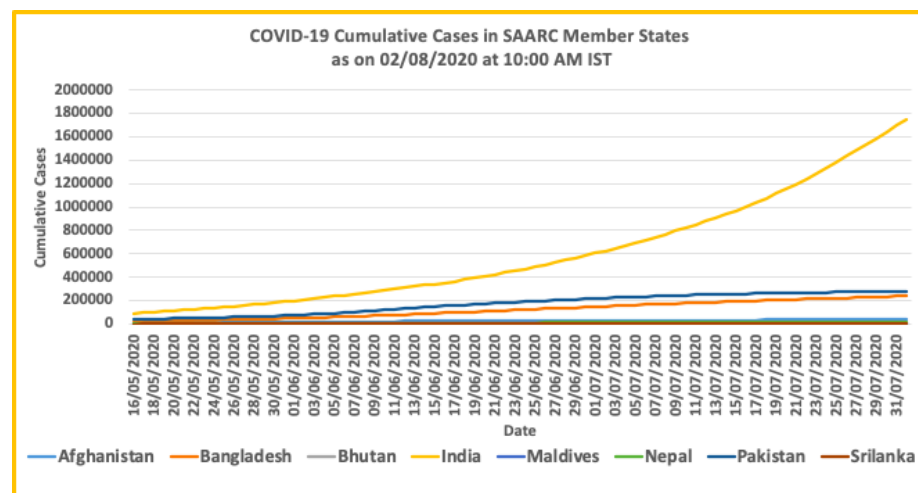
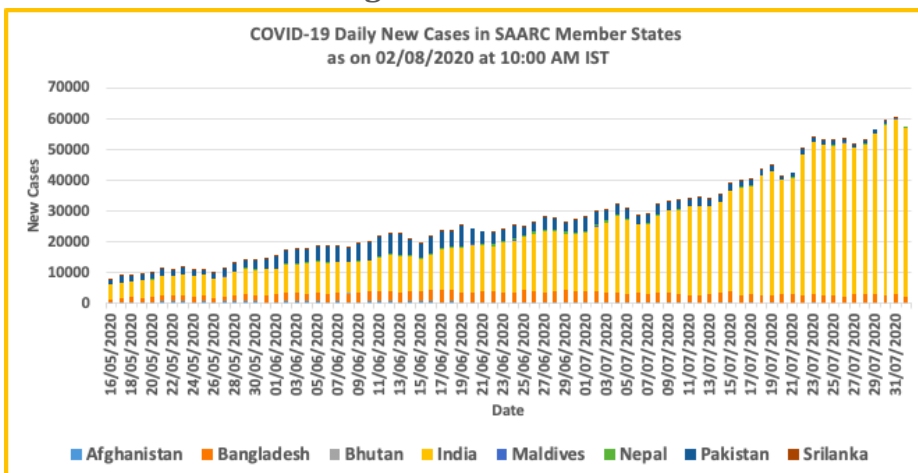

- As of 01st August 2020- 17,396,943 people have been affected by COVID-19 worldwide. About 675,060 lives have been lost. (Source: WHO)
- SAARC region comprises of over 21% of the world's population which remains vulnerable towards COVID-19. The Member States have reported 23,32,549 cases, a total of 47,813 deaths in the region, and 15,74,197 recovered cases.

- The fourth meeting of the International Health Regulations (2005) Emergency Committee regarding COVID-19 was convened by the WHO Director-General on 31 July 2020. The Director-General declared that the outbreak of COVID-19 continues to constitute a public health emergency of international concern (PHEIC). The recommendations from the Emergency Committee highlight the need for response efforts to continue over the long term. *(Source: WHO)*
- Transmission of active COVID19 virus through breast milk and breastfeeding has not been detected to date. There is no reason to avoid or stop breast feeding. *(Source: WHO)*
